
## The Transatlantic Slave Trade - History Y5



Transatlantic Slave Trade: forced migration of millions of people from Africa to the Western Hemisphere from the middle of the 15<sup>th</sup> century to the ed of the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

Enslaved Africans: a human being classed as property, who is owned by another person and is forced to work for nothing!

Atlantic passage: sometimes known as the 'Middle Passage', refers to the part of the trade where enslaved Africans, densely packed onto ships, were transported across the Atlantic to the West Indies.

the transatlantic slave trade is sometimes known as the 'Triangular Trade', since it was three-sided, involving voyages: from Europe to Africa, from Africa to the Americas, from the Americas back to Europe

Plantation: usually a large farm or estate on which cotton, tobacco, coffee sugarcane or the like is grown.

Abolitionists: someone who wanted to end slavery.



Thomas Clarkson Thomas Clarkson was a prominent eighteenth-century antislavery campaigners: in 1787, he helped form the first Abolitionist Committee



Olaudah Equiano Equiano was one of the most prominent black campaigners in the anti-slavery campaign: he was an ex-slave who, by the 1780s, lived as a free man in London, and is mostly remembered for his 1789 autobiography.



William Wilberforce

William Wilberforce was the main figurehead in British Parliament for the abolitionist campaign
